

Table Grape Kyoho



Kyoho grapes

Kyoho grapes are one of the largest species among the grapes produced in Asia by Japan. It is called "the king of grapes in Japan."

Kyoho grapes are a Concord-like cross (*Vitis vinifera* x *Vitis labrusca*) between Ishihara and Centennial grape varieties. Like Concord, Kyoho is a slip-skin variety, meaning that the skin is easily separated from the fruit.

Kyoho grapes are blackish-purple, or almost black, with large seeds. While the seeds are bitter and the skin is not traditionally eaten, the flesh is juicy with high sugar content and mild acidity.

Ripens July to August. Cold hardy to zone 6. 100 hours. Self-fruitful. Spur prune.
